### STELLAR Programme 2.0

- **ST**rategies for **E**nglish **L**anguage **L**earning **A**nd **R**eading
- Vision: Children who love reading and have a strong foundation in the English Language
- Key Learning Goal: to build a strong foundation in English and apply their knowledge, skills and strategies in order to use the language to good effect and at an increasingly sophisticated level to demonstrate learning and mastery

#### STELLAR Programme 2.0

- 14 P1 STELLAR units
- Each unit is structured across 2 weeks and taught in 3 stages:
  - Shared Book Approach (SBA) 1: 1 period
  - O SBA 2: ≈ 10-15 periods
  - o Differentiated Focused Lessons (DFL): ≈ 10 periods

#### SBA 1

 Children read storybook (big book) with the teacher and engage in oral discussions with teacher and peers

#### SBA 2

- Explicit Teaching of Grammar
  - Using modified PPP (presentation, practice and production) strategies
  - Resources contextualised from STELLAR texts
- Reading Comprehension
  - Systematic teaching of close and critical reading skills
- Explicit Teaching of Oracy Skills
  - Provision of oracy lessons to promote thinking and enable our students to discuss, reflect and express their ideas confidently and persuasively

#### SBA 2

- Modified Learning Experience Approach (MLEA)
  - Class Writing: teacher models how students can write about their experiences related to the theme of the big book
  - Group Writing: students work in groups to produce a piece of writing
  - o Individual Writing: students will then write their own composition based on a similar theme on their own

#### **DFL**

- Word study lessons to strengthen word recognition skills
- One reading period set aside each week to promote extensive reading
- Other extension activities

#### Parental Involvement

# You play a significant role in developing the love for reading in your child!

- By reading along with your child, you are helping him or her to overcome the challenge of learning how to read new words.
- When you engage in reading together with your child, your child gains background knowledge that will help him or her better understand different topics in other texts.
- Just by reading a book regularly at home, you become a **role model** for your child as you demonstrate how important reading is to you.

#### Parental Involvement

Reading activities you can engage your child in:

- Play language games, like word scavenger hunt (look for a word in the book)
- Read aloud a book and ask your child to identify words beginning with the same sound, for example, 'p' – pancake, pick, put, police, pat, etc
- Think of new words to replace commonly used words, for example, 'big' – huge, enormous, large, gigantic, etc
- Get your child to retell a story to you in his or her own words
- Get your child to give a different ending to the story read
